## **Executive Summary**

## District Strategic Plan 2025

Orange County Public Schools is the ninth-largest school district in the United States and the fourth largest in Florida. The district serves more than 206,000 students at 202 schools and is one of the largest employers in Central Florida with more than 25,000 team members.

**Vision:** To ensure every student has a promising and successful future.

**Mission:** With the support of families and the community, we create enriching and diverse pathways to lead our students to success.

## **School Collection Development Plan**

Sand Lake Elementary School serves 705 students enrolled in Kindergarten through fifth grades. The student population's ethnicity is made up of 41% Hispanic and 59% Non-Hispanic students. Additionally, we serve a diverse population made up of 74% White, 9% Black, 0% Native, 12% Asian, 1% Pacific, and 3% Multicultural students.

The administration includes Principal Kathleen Phillips. Sand Lake Elementary School is proud to offer the many special programs which provide students with opportunities. These include Battle of the Books, News Crew, Running Club, Girls on the Run, Stingrays Serve, Chess Club, Coding Club, and Lego Club.

A thorough analysis of the current media center collection at Sand Lake Elementary School indicates that the average age of the collection is 2004 and the number of books per student is 26. The <u>American Association for School Libraries</u> has established a criteria for a highly effective media center that includes a ratio of 15-20 books available per student in the collection. At this time, Sand Lake Elementary School does meet the recommended standards for the number of books per student.

The analysis of the collection also revealed the following areas of strengths and concerns:

#### Age of Collection

• The average publication date of 2004 is below the district average of 2007 and needs to be improved. Despite having a large collection that meets the books per student criteria, many of these books will need to be weeded and replaced.

#### Fiction vs. Nonfiction

- There are 1,117 eBooks, audiobooks & digital magazines available in Sora.
- This collection contains many of the titles suggested by the DOE list and the new B.E.S.T. Standards suggested readings.

## Reading Level

• The average reading level of our collection is a 4th grade reading level. We need to acquire lower level offerings to make books more accessible for the rest of our school population.

#### Categories of Concern

• This collection is in need of more popular graphic novels, Latinx/Hispanic representation, lower reading level items, and nonfiction titles.

#### Strategic Focus

- Priority will be given to this section
  - Purchases of new books will focus on Latinx/Hispanic, African American, and Asian representation
  - o Graphic novels
  - o Bilingual books and books in students' native language
  - o Books that include a wider range of reading levels
- Weeding focus
  - Weeding will focus on the OCPS Catalog Project expectations as well as aged titles in fiction and nonfiction.
  - The average age of the collection is too old due to neglected weeding of book sets with aged titles. When weeding is completed, the average age of the collection will greatly improve.

•	Our graphic novel section is a very popular genre. These items fly off the shelves. Having only 92 items in our collection indicates a need to work on increasing this number to more accurately reflect student interests.

## **Representation Analysis**

To deepen focus on strategic collection development, specific sections of the collection were analyzed in detail to determine whether the media center collection reflects and represents various points of view and experiences. The goal is to provide a balanced collection that can be both a mirror, to reflect a reader's experience, and a window, so readers can experience different viewpoints.

#### Results

Based on the available school data of Sand Lake Elementary School in comparison to Collection Analysis results, it was found that:

## Summary

After completing a deeper, targeted analysis of the representation section of the TitleWise report, it was determined that:

- Percentage of students in highest ethnicity vs. books with that representation
  - Hispanic students are 41% of the school's population. However, we only have 26 titles written in Spanish and only 3 of the biographies feature Hispanic people.
  - Many of our students read in their native language as well as emerging second language readers. This is a need in our collection.
- Our school has a growing Hispanic population. Hispanic population grew from 36% last year
  to 38% this year. The media center needs more books featuring Latinx characters and/or
  non-fiction texts with Hispanic role models. Students at our school need more materials in
  which they see themselves.
- African American and Asian representation should also be a focus in selecting new materials for the library.
